A swe finished up our series on the book of Revelation, I've been noticing how much the writers in the Bible talk about heaven as a feast. Eternity kicks off with a party, and there's good things to eat.

All that to say - I've been thinking a lot about how there's going to be work in heaven. But, in all the Bible's visions of heaven no one is afraid, worried, or tired, and there's always enough to go around.

So, if there is work in heaven, it's not work we do to pay the rent or survive, it's work we do for joy and passion — work that enhances our lives, builds community, and satisfies our creativity and curiosity.

When we get to do work out of love and not out of necessity, it will "keep the party going" forever.

I wonder: What kind of work will you want to do?

What kind of work fulfills you, and brings you joy instead of stealing it from you?

I think this is one of the things I love so much about church: church is a little foretaste of heaven! Making church happen certainly takes a lot of work, but it's a beautiful mosaic of each of us giving our time, energy, and skill as a gift of love.

And, just like in heaven, the work we each do for the church makes a space for every person to come to God with us, and brings joy and peace to our neighbors.

I hope you all know how sacred and important the work we do together at PUMC is. Thank you all for your gifts, your skills, and your hearts. I look forward to keeping the party going each week!



She also plays a key role in preparing and sending out the annual stewardship letters (hint: Be on the lookout for that letter in the mail soon!).


We are deeply grateful for Jean, our devoted financial secretary and an Enrolled Agent, whose tireless work makes a significant impact on the financial vitality of our church.


Always close by is Bruce McKeeman, her trusted sidekick offering support along the way.

Task Force Challenged To Find Constructive Way Forward for Esther

The Esther Hall Task Force has been meeting; an architectural review has been submitted; concepts, both physical and inclusive, continue to be considered, debated, and explored.

Esther Hall and its landmark location form the nexus of this effort. "We really need to do something" remains the underlying issue and costs a primary factor for the 'blue sky' task force with no pre-specified limitations to potential size, scope nor end-use considerations.

Objective for the task force is to have a recommendation (as an executable concept) ready in as timely a manner as possible, perhaps as early as the first quarter of 2026. Regardless the recommendation, it will ultimately go before the entire Congregation for final consideration."

Study areas already being deliberated by the task force include an assessment of physical plant needs (repairs, upgrades, re-use possibilities, etc.), identification of use opportunities and impediments, architectural considerations and op-

tions, and an assessment of possible community needs for the physical site.

The church, with its 155-year history as Prescott's first church and Arizona's first Protestant church, has long been considered a business incubator and charter enterprise. This landmark site remains a community destination.

The Esther Hall Task Force continues its almost weekly meeting schedule where discussions include the building needs assessment (a new room, a clean and inviting environ, adequate restroom facilities, modernized and efficient HVAC solutions, etc.), congregational needs (additional meeting space), community needs (service and meeting space for events, groups, activities), community engagement, church growth, and more.

As a task force, its mandate is to explore all options, provide options for moving forward unconstrained by preconceptions, and facilitate wide buy-in across the congregation.


